I hope everyone had a wonderful Christmas and New Year! It's hard to imagine that we are in 2023 already. But a lot has happened since my last report. So let's get caught up.

The elections were interesting. Here in Illinois, I'd say it went nearly the way it was expected to go. As we look ahead, the political mix and climate will look much the same as it has been for several years. Farm Bureau's efforts will likely focus on many familiar legislative issues. They never really go away; they just pop back up in a slightly different form.

One of the items that makes Farm Bureau the grassroots organization it's proud to be is our policy development process. Each year that process ends at the IFB Annual Meeting, where over 350 delegates across the state meet to debate policy proposals. The results of the debates set the policy that will govern Illinois Farm Bureau's actions throughout 2023. A few of the policies that did and did not pass the delegate body include:

- New policy strengthening Farm Bureau's commitment to improving mental health services for farm families. PASSED
- New policy to further address food insecurity needs. PASSED
- Expanded policy to address organic agriculture and specialty crops. PASSED
- Policy to oppose the use of Environmental, Social, and Governance scoring or other subjective scoring methods for federal farm policy debate and any farm programs. PASSED
- Efforts to locate solar energy projects on marginal or underused lands, including brownfield sites, highway right-of-ways, entrance and exit ramps, rest areas, welcome centers, embankments, and on IDNR non-tillable properties, on urban and rural rooftops, vacant lots, farmsteads, and or over parking areas, rather than highly productive, tillable farmland. PASSED
- Requiring telecommunications companies to remove abandoned or obsolete above-ground telecommunications fixtures from right-of-ways or to properly maintain them, if still in use. PASSED

As is usually the case in our delegate debates, a few policy resolutions garnered a lot of solid discussions. As in past years, the contentious debates focused on commercial wind, solar, and pipeline projects. Probably the most controversial debate was the debate on a moratorium on CO2 pipeline projects until improved government safety requirements are completed. This policy did not pass and become IFB policy.

Sangamon County Farm Bureau will continue to add to our existing local policy positions to represent our members. In addition, we will continue the discussion on these matters at the state Farm Bureau level and hope for additional policy.

Explore the fascinating world of honey bees and the steps to becoming a beekeeper at "Introduction to Beekeeping." Topics that will be covered by experienced beekeepers includes life of the bee, common pests and diseases, bee equipment, how to assemble bee equipment, new package installation, how to inspect a hive, and care of the colony.

William N Etherton Scholarship

The William N. Etherton Agricultural Scholarship Fund was created in conjunction with the Sangamon County Farm Bureau Foundation in 2019 by his family. The objective is to award a Sangamon County Student who is pursuing a degree in Agriculture with a scholarship. The Scholarship Fund was created to honor the memory of William N. "Bill" Etherton who passed away on September 18, 2019.

Bill, of Buffalo, Illinois, was raised on the family farm and married Peggy Higginson in 1946. He was then enlisted in the 11th Airborn Division as a paratrooper and served in Japan for two years. Upon his return, he and Peggy started raising corn, beans, cattle, and their four children. Bill was also a member of the Sangamon County Farm Bureau Board, Pork Producers, Sangamon County Extension Council, Mechanicsburg Farmers Grain Elevator, 4-H leader in Lanesville, Illiopolis School Board, Illini Bank and one of the founding members of the Mechanicsburg Citizens Bank. Bill believed that giving young people an opportunity to study agriculture is an important step to ensuring that American agriculture remains the world leader in food, fiber, and fuel.

Developing and implementing a business management contingency plan to overcome unexpected changes to the organizational structure and/or management leadership to a family farm is crucial for the continued success of the farming operation for the next younger generation. The process of succession planning often presents many difficult questions as well as challenges to family members wanting to preserve their family farming legacy. Striving to find answers as well as planning solutions is an essential strategy for keeping a farm in the family for future generations. This presentation will identify guidelines and share planning solutions to insure a successful transfer of farm ownership as well as management control to the next young family farming generation. 



