

JIM BIRGE

As I promised last issue, here's part 2 of the old myth that Illinois Farm Bureau helped start State Farm Insurance. To put much of this into perspective, you may wish to go back and read *The Bureau According to Jim* in the March/April issue of the *Sangamo Farmer*. If you don't have your copy you can view it online at www.sangamonfb.org. Click on the publications link at the bottom of the page.

The research and writing on this subject has already been artfully completed. So there was no reason for me to recreate the story in my words. Therefore, here it is in the words of Steve Simms, Promotion and Graphics Arts Director of Illinois Farm Bureau.

In November of 1925, the Illinois Farm Bureau Board of Directors formed the IAA Farmers Mutual Reinsurance Company. This action was taken based upon the 1924 recommendation of Illinois Farm Bureau's Insurance Committee under the leadership of George Tullock, an IFB Board member from Rockford. The company was organized and chartered to help spread the fire insurance risk for the hundreds of township mutual farmer insurance companies around the state affiliated with county Farm Bureaus. State Farm continued to spread using the Farm Bureau connection. Facing similar financial challenges as the South Dakota Farm Bureau, Missouri Farm Bureau Federation signs on with State Farm in December 1925. In 1926, the state Farm Bureaus in Minnesota, Michigan, and North Dakota join State Farm as state agents in order to solve their financial woes as well.

As the need for auto insurance grows, the IFB Board authorizes the organization to "investigate the advisability of theft, life, and automobile insurance for its members." It's the summer of 1926.

As part of that investigation,

Mecherle met again with the IFB Board in September of 1926. At that meeting Mecherle presented to the Board the same plan other state Farm Bureaus had been adopting. IFB was in much better financial shape than the other state Farm Bureaus who had been signing on with State Farm. After hearing Mecherle's proposal the IFB Board decides: "if IAA enters into the field of auto insurance it will start its own company."

Two months later the IFB Board met in Chicago with county Farm Bureau presidents who unanimously authorized the establishment of the Illinois Agricultural Mutual Insurance Company. Vernon Vaniman was given the assignment to get 3000 advance pledges. By early 1927 he has 3290 and on April 27, 1927, the IAA's insurance company is chartered. J.P. Gibson is hired as manager but is soon replaced by Ara E. Richardson. Richardson had a history with both Farm Bureau and State Farm. At one time he had worked for IFB membership organizer, J.C. Sailor, as a membership recruiter. Richardson had also worked for the Pure Milk Association. It is also noted in the IAA Record that Ara Richardson helped George Mecherle organize State Farm Mutual Insurance Company. However, there are no references to Richardson in State Farm historical materials available to the public. Richardson remained with IAA Insurance until his retirement in 1953.

While Illinois Farm Bureau is organizing its own insurance company, in the spring of 1927, Iowa Farm Bureau approaches State Farm and sets up the same arrangement as Indiana. Shortly after that, upon invitation from the state Farm Bureaus, Mecherle moves into Colorado, Kansas, Kentucky, and Nebraska. In 1928, Mecherle continues his state Farm Bureau partnerships and moves into California, Mississippi, Montana, Nevada, Texas, Utah, and Washington. After nearly a year of discussions, in February of 1929, IFB organizes Country Life Insurance Company. Meanwhile State Farm marches into Arizona, Idaho, New Mexico, West Virginia, and Wyoming, with blessings of the appropriate state Farm Bureau. State Farm moved into North Carolina,

Oklahoma, Oregon, and Virginia in 1930, and Maryland in 1933. Shortly after this state Farm Bureaus began to form their own insurance companies based upon the Illinois model. And those states that struck the bargain with State Farm maintained that relationship into the 1940s and 50s. Eventually, many of these state Farm Bureaus also started their own insurance companies. The cleverness of State Farm's growth and expansion cannot be denied. However, it's worth wondering if the grassroots infrastructure the state Farm Bureaus offered had not been as accessible to Mecherle, would State Farm had grown as quickly as it did? Probably not, but the relationship was symbiotic. There were mutual benefits — no pun intended. Mecherle got the customers he needed, and the state Farm Bureaus got the cash they needed to keep their organizations viable and able to continue to serve their farmer members.

I would say the State Farm/Illinois Farm Bureau story should be heralded and held up as an example of what a bunch of smart farmers can do once they set their minds to it. It's interesting two great organizations that serve farmers well grew from the fertile fields of Central Illinois.

Well, there you have it, "The Rest of The Story" as Paul Harvey would say. Though both companies are well respected and extremely successful, Farm Bureau and I are forever proud to have COUNTRY Financial as our partner to serve the needs of our members. If you ever doubt the commitment of COUNTRY to our members, remember this, COUNTRY is operated by a board of directors comprised entirely of farmers from around Illinois (oddly enough they're the same people that make up the Illinois Farm Bureau Board of Directors). The last meeting of the Policy Development Committee accomplished two primary items. First, we finalized a bylaw proposal for Illinois Farm Bureau and recommended its submittal by the SCFB Board. This bylaw will be voted on at the IFB Annual Meeting in Chicago this coming December. The intent of the bylaw is to require the prior notice of

candidacy of any individual running for election to the IFB board. This would provide the members in each district the opportunity to thoroughly consider each candidate rather than having a last minute candidate announced at the election. This would apply to the 18 districts as well as to the President and Vice President. The bylaw proposal was approved by the board and will be voted on in December.

The second primary item of business was to consider events and programming for the upcoming fiscal year of SCFB which begins June 1st. Some of the events approved by the committee include sending out a complete set of current policies in an upcoming issue of the FarmWeek. In conjunction with this, we'll be hosting our annual Tailgate Talk Cookout to hear from you about issues affecting your farm and determine if something should be placed in our policy to address it. The committee also will utilize mailers to gather member input on the same.

I hope many of you will participate in our efforts. It's important for us to hear from you to address your needs in policy, legislative, regulatory, and legal avenues. Have a wonderful spring and early summer. Good luck with your farm activities and above all, be safe.

GOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS

IFB Executive Director of Governmental Affairs and Commodities Mark Gebhards joined us at our March meeting to give us a legislative update. On the national level, we discussed the Trans-Pacific Partnership, GMO labeling, and ethanol. The current state level issues include, the

state budget, filter strip tax advantage, and expedited review of utility project proposals. He does not think it is likely that there will be a budget for the current budget cycle. Circuit Court Judge April Troemper also joined us in March to introduce herself and give an overview of her background and qualifications. We thank Mark and Judge Troemper for joining us.

On April 7th, State Representative Darin LaHood and IFB President Richard Guebert discussed the importance of the Trans-Pacific Partnership in a press conference at the SCFB office.

There have been several action requests lately regarding GMO labeling and most recently one regarding private property rights. The most recent action request was asking that farmers call their State Senator and ask them to vote no on SB 2237, which protects landowners' property rights. SB 2237 would allow telecommunications companies to install their equipment along road rights-of-way without negotiating an easement with the landowner. The bill also minimizes landowners' ability to ensure that repairs to damages made during installation on items like drain tile are made appropriately and timely. I ask that you please remember to make these calls when state and national legislative action requests come out. These are very important to our well-being as farmers and landowners.

Our April meeting was cancelled, as many of our members were getting into the field. The next GAC meeting is tentatively scheduled for May 2nd. Pending planting progress, the meeting may be rescheduled.
