It seems there is always something thrown at the County Board that requires our involvement. We appreciate the relationship we have with Chairman Van Meter and members of the board. Working together has provided our members with numerous successful outcomes over the years. Finally, in preparation for addressing state and federal issues, of which many will affect agriculture, make sure you are or become a member of FBACT. When Farm Bureau requests members to take action on an issue affecting agriculture, FBACT members receive a text message or email to inform members of an issue and provide a mechanism for you to send a message to your legislators, government agencies, or administrative branches. If you are not an FBACT member or are unsure if you are, text "FARM" to 52886, and you will get registered to begin receiving them. When an action request is sent, you generally need to click the link provided in the message. Usually, all you need to do is enter your name and address and click send. Simple!

I hope everyone has a productive spring and a fun-filled summer with family and friends.

Committee Reports

Our committee has been working with our elected officials regarding several issues. And there are more issues to deal with as we look ahead. So let's take a look at the details.

First, we'll aim for the local scene. We've discussed three issues with the Zoning & Land Use Committee, Road and Bridge Committee, or the County Board. Unfortunately, two of these issues just keep on giving. Our favorites are wind/solar siting and the CO2 pipeline. Unfortunately, those discussions never seem to go away; some will likely not anytime soon.

As for wind/solar siting, the state took away local siting of such projects to administer a one size fits all set of standards across Illinois. I don't know about you, but I'd rather trust our county government to decide what's best for Sangamon County residents than the state. We continue working with

our county government to solve the state's ongoing war against local governance. And they're not done yet. The state wants to take other local control powers away from county governments.

Our other favorite local issue is the ongoing plans to construct the Navigator CO2 pipeline. Numerous groups and individuals in the county have been vocal in opposing the pipeline. As you have hopefully seen, the Sangamon County Farm Bureau Board has taken a formal position in opposition to the pipeline. Our overarching reason is the safety concern of the public. We cannot compromise when it comes to the lives of our members and their families.

Last on the local scene is a resolution passed by the County Board recognizing the importance of agriculture in Sangamon County and pledging to continue support for it. We appreciate their vote of confidence and the strong working relationship we enjoy.

The General Assembly has numerous bills and issues roaming its halls. For ag, we are seeking to increase the state estate tax exemption level to match that of the federal estate tax exemption level. We are also asking for changes in the state wind/solar siting standards, although developers are unwilling to budge much. Need I restate that these negotiations were in better hands when the county addressed them?

On the national scene, we're still waiting to see if farm bill negotiations will be held seriously and result in getting a bill done this year. Both the Senate and House Ag Committee Chairs seem to want to get it done; however, that does not guarantee its success.

One last notable issue "floating around" is the legal challenges to the Waters of the United States (WOTUS) Rule. The U.S. District Court has issued an opinion that the rule has serious constitutional concerns. However, President Biden vetoed a bill to overturn the rule in April. So the saga continues. More on that in future editions of the Sangamo Farmer.

At least it's summer and coming upon fair season. So maybe you can enjoy all they offer and take your mind off some governmental issues that weigh everyone down. We'll keep our eyes on them for you as we always do.

Agriculture jobs outpace graduates

Good news for the soon-to-be senior in our house: The nation's largest employer is looking for applicants. The agriculture industry comprises about 11% of the jobs in the United States, employing more citizens than any other industry at 22 million people across more than 250 career areas, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Contrary to popular belief, farmers are just a sliver of agriculture's employment pie, and there's plenty of pie available for anyone with the hunger to support the nation's need for food, fiber and fuel. No farm background required.

The demand for agricultural engineers, agronomists, plant breeders, foresters, veterinarians, agriscience teachers, climate specialists and more will outpace the available college graduates in these disciplines. More than 59,000 job openings will be available – per year – in agriculture, food, renewable natural resources and related industries through at least 2025, according to the 2020-2025 Employment Opportunities Report by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Purdue University.

Students who enjoy biochemistry perhaps haven't thought to consider a career in agronomy or biofuels. The mechanically minded may like a profession as an agriculture engineer or precision agriculture specialist. Writers may find fitting opportunities as agricultural journalists.

For good reason, the wall in our high school agriculture classroom says, "Your Career Starts Here." In the last 10 years alone, I have watched students at our small school find their passions through agricultural education and the leadership and career-developing experiences of the FFA.

They now serve the agriculture industry as agronomists, farm financial officers, agricultural educators, agricultural engineers, livestock managers and diesel technicians. My husband has hired graduates to work with precision technologies and vehicle autonomy in agriculture. Some prepare for an ag-related career, training to become agricultural accountants, veterinarians and horticulturists.

The Illinois Agri-Food Alliance, of which the Illinois Farm Bureau is a founding member, recently launched AGNITOR, a digital platform to connect agri-food professionals to classrooms for virtual chats about careers. The program intends to generate student awareness about career opportunities spanning agriculture, food and natural resources. The National FFA offers opportunities to digitally explore agricultural careers, too. These tools can help students like our daughter find their ideal fit in this diverse and necessary industry.




Collaborative efforts are an emphasis of the Illinois Nutrient Loss Reduction Strategy (NLRS) as an essential venture to meet state and regional nutrient reduction goals. The **Woodchip Bioreactor Partnership** (Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB), Illinois Land Improvement Contractors Association (ILICA), National Resource Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS), and University of Illinois (U of I) and **Saturated Buffer Partnership** (IFB, ILICA, USDA-NRCS, and Southern Illinois University Carbondale (SIUC) were developed by stakeholders to help meet common goals: implement and monitor conservation best management practices (BMPs), as well as provide education and outreach.

Join us to hear from several ag engineering and BMP construction experts, university researchers, and many others about ongoing edge-of-field practice implementation and monitoring efforts. Attendees will be transported between a saturated buffer and a woodchip bioreactor to see the practices on the ground.
